Rules and Regulations

- No person shall enter more than one item in any one section. All articles to be the exhibitor's own work and entered in exhibitor's name only. All articles must be new, handmade and have not been previously exhibited at our Fair.
- Titles, namely Bake Queen, Homemaking Queen, Golden King or Queen, and all elementary ambassadors, can only be given to one person for two consecutive years. In the event that any title should be won for the third year by any one person, the title would then go to the second-place entrant. No person can hold more than one title.
- All persons on the grounds will be subject to the rules of the Managing Committee. Exhibitors interfering with the judges will forfeit their prizes.
- The Directors of the Association agree to take every reasonable precaution to ensure the safety of articles sent to the exhibition. It must be distinctly understood that the owners are to assume all risks, and should any articles be accidentally damaged, lost or stolen, Directors will render all assistance in their power for the recovery of same, but they will not recognize any claim for payment of the value or any portion thereof.
- Judges have full power to classify all articles that are being exhibited.
- Group entries allowed ONLY in Class 21E or 21F
- Prizes will be paid as soon as possible. Cheques must be cashed before

December 31, 2023

- Ten percent of all prize money of ten dollars and over will be retained.
- All exhibits for display in Exhibition Building will be received Thursday of the Fair from 4p.m. to 9 p.m. Flowers in Class 25 and Food in Class 16B and 16C will be received Friday of the fair, from 8 a.m. until 10:30 a.m. All property exhibited must remain on the grounds and in the buildings until 4:15 p.m. on Saturday of the Fair, if removed before that hour, prizes will be forfeited. Adequate protection will be provided for all exhibits.

- **Judging will be done according to the criteria in the newly revised OAAS Rules.**

YOUTH Section (CLASSES 1-15)

Every Child Handing in an Exhibitor's Form with exhibits will be eligible for a Draw Prize. Door prize ticket must be filled out at the registration table on Thursday evening before the fair at Registration (*This is the responsibility of the exhibitor and his/her parents.*)

There will be 5 young ambassadors: Preschool Ambassador, Primary Ambassador, Junior Ambassador, Intermediate Ambassador, and Senior Ambassador.

To become the ambassador for your age group, your points will be totaled from classes 1,3 and 4. You must have entries in at least 2 other classes in the fair. Other Classes include: Jr. Culinary, Student Art, Student Photography, Elementary Fruits & Vegetables, Elementary Flowers, Penmanship, and Colouring Contest. Entrants do not need to enter each section in a class.

Birth years to be used for ages.

Entrants do not need to enter each section in a class. Entries are to be the work of the child. Boxed mixes are not to be used.

CLASS 2 - PROVINCIAL, DISTRICT & FAIR SPECIAL CHOCOLATE CHIP COOKIE COMPETITION

Born in 2008 or later

Prizes: 1st. \$5, 2nd \$4, 3rd \$3

Section 1

(5) Plain chocolate chip cookies, with no nuts, must be no larger than 3" (6.75 cm) and no smaller than 2" (5 cm).

Hint: must be able to taste the dough, fewer chips is better.

RULES:

- Contest is open to youth up to age 15 years (as of December 31, 2023).
- WINNER to go on to district competition in November 2023.

District Competition

- The winner from each Fair/Exhibition will be eligible to enter at the District Competition.
- District entry must consist of 8 cookies displayed on a firm, disposable plate.
- Plain chocolate chip cookies, with no nuts, must be no larger than 3" (6.75 cm) and no smaller than 2" (5 cm).
- Prize money to be paid by the District.

Provincial Competition

- The entrant must be the winner from the District Competition.
- In the case where the district winner is unable to send an entry to the convention, then the 2nd place District winner will be eligible to enter.
- The entry for the District must consist of 8 cookies displayed on a plate provided by the OAAS Chocolate Chip Cookie Committee.
- Plain Chocolate Chip Cookies, with no nuts are to be no larger than 3" (6.75 cm) and no smaller than 2" (5 cm).
- The entry must be tagged with the exhibitor's name, address and District represented using the entry tag provided.
- Cookies will be judged according to the OAAS Homecraft Judging Standards. 14. Entries will be received at the convention, according to the convention schedule. Judging will commence at 9:00 am to 9:30 am.

- Exhibitor to supply own containers.
- An exhibit may only be entered in one section, and only one prize allowed to an exhibitor in each section.
- Entries containing more or less than specified blooms will be disqualified.
- No exhibit will be given a prize unless deemed worthy by the judge.
- No dried or artificial flowers to be used in any exhibit.

HINTS TO FLOWER SHOW EXHIBITORS

Collection - Number of kinds of varieties of flowers shown as one exhibit. The quality and variety of the blooms, and the artistic effect of the exhibit to be judged.

Arrangement - The use of fresh flowers organized to create an attractive display. Flowers should be as fresh as possible. Trim off dead foliage and petals, being careful not to destroy their symmetry or to leave any tell tale tissue at the base.

Remove spray or dust residue. Foliage should be naturally attached.

Where different varieties are shown in one class, one variety is not judged against another, but whether it is a better specimen of its variety than others of its own variety. Rose blooms should be one half to three quarters open at time of judging.

Height is an important factor in arrangements where a definite purpose is specified, such as a dining room table or mantel display.

Nosegay - Small tied bouquet, suitable to carry in hand.

Novelty Floral Arrangement - Flowers arranged in a novelty container, something other than a purchased article.
